

Intended use

Your STANLEY FATMAX SFMCBL730 blower has been designed for various blowing & cleaning applications. This appliance is intended for professional and private, non-professional use only.

Safety instructions

General safety warnings Warning! Read all safety warnings and all instructions.

Failure to follow the warnings and instructions may result in electric shock, fire and/or serious injury.

Save all warnings and instructions for future reference.

The term "power tool" in all of the warnings listed below refers to your mains operated (corded) power tool or battery operated (cordless) power tool.

- 1. Work area safety
- a. Keep work area clean and well lit. Cluttered or dark areas invite accidents.
- b. Do not operate power tools in explosive atmospheres, such as in the presence of flammable liquids, gases or dust. Power tools create sparks which may ignite the dust or fumes.
- c. Keep children and bystanders away while operating a power tool. Distractions can cause you to lose control.
- 2. Electrical safety
- a. Power tool plugs must match the outlet. Never modify the plug in any way.

Do not use any adapter plugs with earthed (grounded) power tools. Unmodified plugs and matching outlets will reduce risk of electric shock.

- b. Avoid body contact with earthed or grounded surfaces such as pipes, radiators, ranges and refrigerators. There is an increased risk of electric shock if your body is earthed or grounded.
- c. Do not expose power tools to rain or wet conditions. Water entering a power tool will increase the risk of electric shock.
- d. Do not abuse the cord. Never use the cord for carrying, pulling or unplugging the power tool. Keep cord away from heat, oil, sharp edges or moving parts. Damaged or entangled cords increase the risk of electric shock.
- e. When operating a power tool outdoors, use an extension cord suitable for outdoor use. Use of a cord suitable for outdoor use reduces the risk of electric shock.
- f. If operating a power tool in a damp location is unavoidable, use a residual current device (RCD) protected supply. Use of an RCD reduces the risk of electric shock.
- 3. Personal safety
- a. Stay alert, watch what you are doing and use common sense when operating a power tool.

Do not use a power tool while you are tired or under the influence of drugs, alcohol or medication. A moment of inattention while operating power tools may result in serious personal injury.

- b. Use personal protective equipment. Always wear eye protection. Protective equipment such as dust mask, non-skid safety shoes, hard hat, or hearing protection used for appropriate conditions will reduce personal injuries.
- c. Prevent unintentional starting. Ensure the switch is in the offposition before connecting to power source and/or battery pack, picking up or carrying the tool. Carrying power tools with your finger on the switch or energising power tools that have the switch on invites accidents.
- d. Remove any adjusting key or wrench before turning the power tool on.

A wrench or a key left attached to a rotating part of the power tool may result in personal injury.

- e. Do not overreach. Keep proper footing and balance at all times. This enables better control of the power tool in unexpected situations.
- f. Dress properly. Do not wear loose clothing or jewellery. Keep your hair, clothing and gloves away from moving parts. Loose clothes, jewellery or long hair can be caught in moving parts.

- g. If devices are provided for the connection of dust extraction and collection facilities, ensure these are connected and properly used. Use of dust collection can reduce dust-related hazards.
- h. Do not let familiarity gained from frequent use of tools allow you to become complacent and ignore tool safety principles. A careless action can cause severe injury within a fraction of a second.
- 4. Power tool use and care
- a. Do not force the power tool. Use the correct power tool for your application. The correct power tool will do the job better and safer at the rate for which it was designed.
- b. Do not use the power tool if the switch does not turn it on and off. Any power tool that cannot be controlled with the switch is dangerous and must be repaired.
- c. Disconnect the plug from the power source and/or the battery pack from the power tool before making any adjustments, changing accessories, or storing power tools.
 Such preventive safety measures reduce the risk of starting the power tool accidentally.
- d. Store idle power tools out of the reach of children and do not allow persons unfamiliar with the power tool or these instructions to operate the power tool.

Power tools are dangerous in the hands of untrained users.

- e. Maintain power tools. Check for misalignment or binding of moving parts, breakage of parts and any other condition that may affect the power tools operation. If damaged, have the power tool repaired before use. Many accidents are caused by poorly maintained power tools.
- f. Keep cutting tools sharp and clean. Properly maintained cutting tools with sharp cutting edges are less likely to bind and are easier to control.
- g. Use the power tool, accessories, and tool bits, etc. in accordance with these instructions, taking into account the working conditions and the work to be performed. Use of the power tool for operations different from those intended could result in a hazardous situation.
- h. Keep handles and grasping surfaces dry, clean and free from oil and grease. Slippery handles and grasping surfaces do not allow for safe handling and control of the tool in unexpected situations.
- 5. Battery tool use and care
- a. Recharge only with the charger specified by the manufacturer. A charger that is suitable for one type of battery pack may create a risk of fire when used with another battery pack.
- b. Use power tools only with specifically designated battery packs.

Use of any other battery packs may create a risk of injury and fire.

- c. When battery pack is not in use, keep it away from other metal objects, like paper clips, coins, keys, nails, screws, or other small metal objects, that can make a connection from one terminal to another. Shorting the battery terminals together may cause burns or a fire.
- d. Under abusive conditions, liquid may be ejected from the battery; avoid contact. If contact accidentally occurs, flush with water.

If liquid contacts eyes, additionally seek medical help. Liquid ejected from the battery may cause irritation or burns.

- e. Do not use a battery pack or tool that is damaged or modified. Damaged or modified batteries may exhibit unpredictable behaviour resulting in fire, explosion or risk of injury.
- f. Do not expose a battery pack or tool to fire or excessive temperature.
 Exposure to fire or temperature above 130 °C may cause explosion.
- g. Follow all charging instructions and do not charge the battery pack or tool outside the temperature range specified in the instructions. Charging improperly or at temperatures outside the specified range may damage the battery and increase the risk of fire.

- a. Have your power tool serviced by a qualified repair person using only identical replacement parts. This will ensure that the safety of the power tool is maintained.
- b. Never service damaged battery packs. Service of battery packs should only be performed by the manufacturer or authorized service providers.

Additional power tool safety warnings

Warning! Additional safety warnings for blowers. The intended use is described in this manual. The use of any accessory or attachment or performance of any operation with this appliance other than those recommended in this instruction manual can present a risk of personal injury and/or damage to property.

- To protect your feet and legs while operating the appliance, always wear heavy duty footwear and long trousers.
- Always remove the battery from the appliance whenever the appliance is unattended, before clearing a blockage, before cleaning and maintenance, after striking a foreign object or whenever the appliance starts vibrating abnormally.
- Do not place the inlet or outlet of the sweeper near eyes or ears when operating. Never blow debris in the direction of bystanders.
- Do not use in the rain or leave outdoors while it is raining.

- Do not cross gravel paths or roads whilst your product is switched on during blow mode. Walk, never run.
- Do not place your unit down on gravel while it is switched on.
- Always be sure of your footing, particularly on slopes. Do not overreach and keep your balance at all times.
- Do not place any objects into the openings. Never use if the openings are blocked.

 Keep free of hair, lint, dust and anything that may reduce the airflow.
 Warning! Always use your product in the manner outlined in this manual. Your product is designed to be used in an upright mode and if it is used in any other way it may result in injury. Never run your product whilst lying on it's side or upside down.

- The operator or user is responsible for accidents or hazards occurring to other people or their property.
- Do not use solvents or cleaning fluids to clean your product. Use a blunt scraper to remove grass and dirt.
- Replacement fans are available from a STANLEY FATMAX service agent. Use on STANLEY FATMAX recommended spare parts and accessories.
- Keep all nuts bolts and screws tight to make sure that the appliance is in a safe working condition.
- Wear ear protectors with blowers.
 Exposure to noise can cause hearing loss.

Vibration

The declared vibration emission values stated in the technical data and the declaration of conformity have been measured in accordance with a standard test method provided by EN60335 and may be used for comparing one tool with another.

The declared vibration emission value may also be used in a preliminary assessment of exposure.

Warning! The vibration emission value during actual use of the power tool can differ from the declared value depending on the ways in which the tool is used. The vibration level may increase above the level stated.

When assessing vibration exposure to determine safety measures required by 2002/44/EC to protect persons regularly using power tools in employment, an estimation of vibration exposure should consider, the actual conditions of use and the way the tool is used, including taking account of all parts of the operating cycle such as the times when the tool is switched off and when it is running idle in addition to the trigger time.

Safety of Others

The appliance is only to be used with the power supply unit recommended for this appliance.

- This appliance is not intended for use by persons (including children) with reduced physical, sensory or mental capabilities, or lack of experience and knowledge, unless they have been given supervision or instruction concerning use of the appliance by a person responsible for their safety.
- Do not use when people, especially children or pets are nearby.

Children should be supervised to ensure that they do not play with the appliance.

Residual risks

Additional residual risks may arise when using the tool which may not be included in the enclosed safety warnings. These risks can arise from misuse, prolonged use, etc.

Even with the application of the relevant safety regulations and the implementation of safety devices, certain residual risks can not be avoided. These include:

- Injuries caused by touching any rotating/moving parts.
- Injuries caused when changing any parts, blades or accessories.
- Injuries caused by prolonged use of a tool. When using any tool for prolonged periods ensure you take regular breaks.
- Impairment of hearing.
- Health hazards caused by breathing dust developed when using your tool (example:- working with wood, especially oak, beech and MDF.)

Labels on tool

Additional safety instructions for batteries and chargers

Batteries

- Never attempt to open for any reason.
- Do not expose the battery to water.
- Do not store in locations where the temperature may exceed 40 °C.
- Charge only at ambient temperatures between 10 °C and 40 °C.
- Charge only using the charger provided with the tool.

- When disposing of batteries, follow the instructions given in the section "Protecting the environment".
 - Do not attempt to charge

damaged batteries.

Chargers

- Use your STANLEY FATMAX charger only to charge the battery in the tool with which it was supplied. Other batteries could burst, causing personal injury and damage.
- Never attempt to charge nonrechargeable batteries.
- Have defective cords replaced immediately.
- Do not expose the charger to water.
- Do not open the charger.
- Do not probe the charger.



The charger is intended for indoor use only.



Read the instruction manual before use.

Electrical safety

Your STANLEY FATMAX charger is double insulated; therefore no earth wire is required. Always check that the mains voltage corresponds to the voltage on the rating plate. Never attempt to replace the charger unit with a regular mains plug. If the supply cord is damaged, it must be replaced by the manufacturer or an authorised STANLEY FATMAX Service Centre in order to avoid a hazard.

Description

This tool includes some or all of the following features.

- 1. Variable speed trigger
- 2. Boost button
- 3. Handle
- 4. Upper blower tube
- 5. Lower blower tube
- 6. Battery
- 7. Battery release button

Use

Warning! Let the tool work at its own pace. Do not overload.

Charging the battery (Fig. A)

The battery needs to be charged before first use and whenever it fails to produce sufficient power on jobs that were easily done before.

The battery may become warm while charging; this is normal and does not indicate a problem.

Warning! Do not charge the battery at ambient temperatures below 10 °C or above 40 °C. Recommended charging temperature: approx. 24 °C.

Note: The charger will not charge a battery if the cell temperature is below approximately 10 °C or above 40 °C. The battery should be left in the charger and the charger will begin to charge automatically when the cell temperature warms up or cools down.

Note: To ensure maximum performance and life of lithium-ion battery packs, charge the battery pack fully before first use.

- Plug the charger (8) into an appropriate outlet before inserting battery pack (6).
- The green charging light (8a) will blink continuously indicating that the charging process has started.
- The completion of charge will be indicated by the green charging light (8a) remaining ON continuously. The battery pack (6) is fully charged and may be removed and used at this time or left in the charger (8).
- Charge discharged batteries within 1 week. Battery life will be greatly diminished if stored in a discharged state.

Charger LED Modes

1

Charging: Green LED Intermittent



Fully Charged: Green LED Solid	
Hot/Cold Pack Delay: Green LED Intermittent Red LED Solid	

Note: The compatible charger(s) will not charge a faulty battery pack. The charger will indicate a faulty battery pack by refusing to light.

Note: This could also mean a problem with a charger. If the charger indicates a problem, take the charger and battery pack to be tested at an authorized service centre.

Leaving the battery in the charger

The charger and battery pack can be left connected with the LED glowing indefinitely. The charger will keep the battery pack fresh and fully charged.

Hot/Cold Pack Delay

When the charger detects a battery that is too hot or too cold, it automatically starts a Hot/Cold Pack Delay, the green LED (8a) will flash intermittently, while the red LED (8b) will remain on continuously, suspending charging until the battery has reached an appropriate temperature. The charger then automatically switches to the pack charging mode. This feature ensures maximum battery life.

Battery state of charge indicator (Fig. B)

The battery includes a state of charge indicator to quickly determine the extent of battery life as shown in Fig. B. By pressing the state of charge button (6a) you can easily view the charge remaining in the battery as illustrated in Fig. B.



Blow Tube Assembly (Fig. C)

Caution:

- Blow tubes must be assembled before use.
- Never operate without the upper tube assembled to the blower and the lower tube assembled to the upper tube.
- In the interest of safety, it is not intended for the tubes to be separated once assembled.

To Assemble Blower Tubes

• Align the upper tube (4) to the blower and the lower tube (5) to the upper tube as shown in Fig. C.

- Push the upper tube firmly onto the blower, until the lock engages and an audible click is heard.
- Then push the lower tube firmly into the upper tube, until the lock engages and an audible click is heard.
- + Pull on the tubes to ensure they are securely in place.
- To remove the tube, insert a screwdriver into the unlocking hole (9) on the side of the housing. Lift the tab inside and pull tube out.

Operation

Warning! To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, turn unit off and remove the battery pack before making any adjustments or removing/installing attachments or accessories. An accidental start-up can cause injury.
Warning! Do not operate blower without blow tube securely in place. Never reach down into housing through tube hole.
Warning! Always wear safety glasses. Always wear respiratory protection. Always wear hearing protection. Use of rubber gloves and substantial footwear is recommended when working outdoors. Keep long hair and loose clothing away from openings and moving parts. For household use only.
Warning! Cut Hazard. When turning the tool off, wait 10 seconds for the fan to stop rotating before removing the blower tube.

- Always ensure the blower is switched OFF and the battery is removed when:
 - -You leave blower unattended.
 - -Clearing a blockage.

-Checking, adjusting, cleaning or working on blower.

Only use blower in daylight or good artificial light.

Inserting and removing the battery pack from the tool (Fig. D)

Warning! Before removing or installing battery, make certain the trigger switch (1) is in the off position to prevent switch actuation.

Note: Make sure your battery pack (6) is fully charged.

To install the battery pack into the tool handle

- Align the battery pack (6) with the rails inside the tool's handle (Fig. D).
- Slide it into the handle until the battery pack is firmly seated in the tool and ensure that you hear the lock snap into place.

To remove the battery pack from the tool

- Press the release button (7) and firmly pull the battery pack out of the tool handle.
- Insert battery pack into the charger as described in the charger section of this manual.

Proper hand position (Fig. E)

Warning! To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, **ALWAYS** use proper hand position as shown.

Warning! To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, ALWAYS hold securely in anticipation of a sudden reaction. Proper hand position requires one hand on the main handle (3).

Switching on (Fig. F)

Warning! Use both hands to grip the product firmly when switching on.

Warning! Do not point unit discharge at self or bystanders. Warning! Always wear safety glasses and hearing protection. Wear a filter mask if the operation is dusty. Use of gloves, long pants and substantial footwear is recommended. Keep long hair and loose clothing away from openings and moving parts.

- To turn the blower on, depress the variable speed trigger (1).
- Release the variable speed trigger (1) to turn the blower off.
- Hold the blower with one hand as shown in Fig. E and sweep from side to side with the tube (4) several inches above the hard surface. Slowly advance keeping the accumulated pile of debris in front of you.

Boost Button

The boost button (2) is located on the tool handle. It allows you to optimize the tools performance and boost the power as needed.

- Switch the blower on.
- To activate the boost mode, press the boost button down.
- To deactivate the boost mode, press the boost button down.
- Operate in normal mode for most blowing needs. (Longer runtime will be achieved.)
- Activate boost mode as needed to clear heavy debris.

Weather Guard

This product (not including the battery pack or charger) has some level of protection from liquids (light splashing) during normal and reasonable use.

Warning! The battery and charger do not have Weather Guard protection.

Warning! NEVER submerge the product, battery or charger in liquid or use in the rain.

Maintenance

Your STANLEY FATMAX power tool has been designed to operate over a long period of time with a minimum of maintenance. Continuous satisfactory operation depends upon proper tool care and regular cleaning.

Warning! To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, turn tool off and disconnect battery pack before making any adjustments or removing/installing attachments or accessories. An accidental start-up can cause injury. Your charger does not require any maintenance apart from regular cleaning.

Warning! Before performing any maintenance on the tool, remove the battery from the tool. Unplug the charger before cleaning it.

- Regularly clean the ventilation slots in your tool and charger using a soft brush or dry cloth.
- Regularly clean the motor housing using a damp cloth.
- Do not use any abrasive or solvent-based cleaner.



Lubrication

Your power tool requires no additional lubrication.



Cleaning

Warning! Blow dirt and dust out of the main housing with dry air as often as dirt is seen collecting in and around the air vents. Wear approved eye protection and approved dust mask when performing this procedure.

Warning! Never use solvents or other harsh chemicals for cleaning the non-metallic parts of the tool. These chemicals may weaken the materials used in these parts. Use a cloth dampened only with water and mild soap. Never let any liquid get inside the tool; never immerse any part of the tool into a liquid.

Replacement Accessories

Warning! To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, turn appliance off and remove battery before making any adjustments or removing/installing attachments or accessories.

Warning! The use of any accessory not recommended by STANLEY FATMAX for use with this appliance could be hazardous.

Warning! Do not use any accessory or attachment other than those recommended by STANLEY FATMAX on this trimmer. Serious injury or product damage may result.

Optional Accessories

Warning! Since accessories, other than those offered by STANLEY FATMAX, have not been tested with this product, use of such accessories with this tool could be hazardous. To reduce the risk of injury, only STANLEY FATMAX recommended accessories should be used with this product. Consult your dealer for further information on the appropriate accessories.
